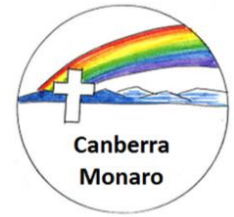

A message from our Community Spiritual Director

Preparation for Easter



Easter is nearly upon us, and I think we can say that it is fully time to prepare for it.

Indeed, it is probably past time.

Preparations for Going Fourth are nearly complete and our budding teams are preparing already for this year's Walks.

So, what does effective preparation involve?

1. A change in Focus

You can't begin to prepare for anything until you begin to think

about it. There is that still small voice that calls us to consider that we need to get ready for whatever is coming.

The prophet Isaiah speaks about hearing a voice. The voice calls out in the desert and tells us about the coming of the Lord.

A few years ago I went to central Australia and I quite enjoyed the desert, but I eventually came home a bit earlier than I had planned, partly on account of loneliness. The desert may not be a good place for you right now either. Today you may feel like you are in the desert. The desert of your life may feel like a spiritually barren wasteland. Your soul is dry and parched. You are weary and thirsty – in need of living water. You may find yourself living consistently without taking any significant time for prayer, or having a difficult time worshiping or witnessing; nothing seems to please you or give you peace.

And yet the voice cries out - change your focus. Turn from yourself and your troubles to God, for the startling sound of the voice crying out reminds us of God's unfailing love even in the dry times.

2. A change in Priorities

If we are to make preparation, there is a second step we must take. Change our priorities.

When you think about John the Baptist, what were his priorities? I'm pretty sure we can say that John was not consumed with the riches and cares of this life. His priority was on the Lord instead of the pursuit of wealth and position. He lived life very differently from how the high priest and social elite within Jerusalem lived. He lived life very differently from how most of us live today. Now I'm not suggesting that we should imitate his lifestyle, not even Jesus did that, but his voice calls us to imitate his commitment to his calling, and to consider our own priorities in relation to God's call.

His life reveals that obedience to God's call is more desirable than the acceptance of men or the living of a comfortable life. He is looking for faithful submission, not cultural acceptance.

So what priorities might the voice be calling you and me to change?

3. A change in Activities

So the third step in the process of preparation after changing our focus and then changing our priorities is to change our activities. In Isaiah 40:4 there is an image of road works, preparing the way for the coming king. I learned about roading in my forestry degree, and it was fun – very practical.

The voice calls:

A. *Fill in the valleys of indifference.*

Valleys can be dangerous places, and many a bushwalker has lost their way and their life because they tried to take the easiest way out, got into a valley and could not be rescued in time.

Indifference is often seen as the easiest way, but we cannot be indifferent about the truth because we will be indifferent ultimately about

Jesus. Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth and the life." Jn 14:6. If we do believe in him we have to do something about it and make the daily decision to follow Jesus.

B. Flatten the hills of pride.

Mountains are as dangerous as valleys. There is often steep climbing, cliffs and obstacles.

When we are on the mountain on a spiritual high and feel that we are going great, look out for pride and remember that all we accomplish is by the grace of God.

C. Straighten the crooked ways.

When you see a sign on the highway "Old Highway", what would you imagine that road is like? It is usually twisty and rough.

So, straighten out the road. As you focus on the goal ahead don't get distracted. This is something I have to be careful about. Just as Jesus set his face towards Jerusalem and would not be distracted so we too need to keep the main thing the main thing.

D. Smooth out the rough places of sin.

Finally, there is still the very important smoothing of the road before we would consider the road ready for use.

We grow to become more like Jesus by rooting out sin, always being honest, and having no shady dealings. Cleaning up your life can become a not insignificant job in and of itself.

As I have grown older, Sanctification is an essential part of my preparation not only for a life in mission, but also in preparation for the day I see Him face to face in Glory. The process of change or more properly, transformation, is not really about us gritting our teeth, trying harder and working to change ourselves, but it is about heart transformation which is about worshiping God and him alone.

The spiritual preparations we make for Easter, a Walk or anything in life by changing our focus, changing our priorities and changing our activities, prepares us for mission and ultimately prepares us for His final return.

Serving in the dining room on the Walk

Think back to your own Emmaus Walk and remember how you felt when you saw people in the dining room welcoming you and serving your meals. When I did my Emmaus Walk I felt surprised that people who did not even know me would come and serve. The act of others serving those on my walk really demonstrated God's love to me.

Information about serving rosters

What?

- Helping to set up the dining room tables before each meal.
- Greeting pilgrims and team as they enter the dining room.
- Serving tables with drinks, checking in with the people at the tables to see if they need anything, cleaning away the tables as people are finished.
- Cleaning the tables after the meal is finished.
- Serving breakfast, morning tea, lunch, afternoon tea, dinner and supper.



Who?

- Servants are aged 18 years old or older.
- Generally servants are people who have done an Emmaus Walk and those who know pilgrims on the Walk.

When?

- Serving is available for the whole of both the Men's and Women's Walks.
- Opportunities are available to serve at all meals on the Walk, setting up on the Thursday, decorating the dining room on the Saturday afternoon, and setting up on the Sunday afternoon.

Where?

- The dining room at Greenhills Conference Centre.

How long for?

- Serving at breakfast, lunch or dinner takes approximately 1.5 hours each.
- Serving at morning tea, afternoon tea or supper takes approximately 45 minutes each.

Cost?

- The cost is very low as the only cost of serving is if you would like to have a meal with your fellow servants after serving. Cost for meals are \$15 except the Saturday dinner which is \$25.

Reasons to serve

- After the humbling experience of being served on your pilgrim Walk, you can now pass on that experience to new pilgrims.
- Through serving you are demonstrating agape love to the pilgrims and to the team.
- Serving together with others is a bonding experience.
- There is a real sense of satisfaction seeing others that you are serving enjoying themselves and the experience of the dining room.
- Feeling like you are a part of a team on the Walk and that you are making a difference.

Sign up?

- You can sign up to serve on the Walk by putting your name down on the rosters. I would recommend signing up early so you can block this time out in your diaries.
- You can sign up by making contact with the serving roster co-ordinator, Kirsty Ross
- You can sign up to have a meal - this needs to be done at the latest two weeks before the Walks.

72 Hour Prayer Vigil



During each Walk the Community makes a commitment to pray for the Walk, the Team and the Pilgrims from Thursday evening until the end of Closing on Sunday evening for the 72 hours of the Walk. To achieve this a Prayer Vigil is put together broken up into 30 minute slots (or spots); this works out to be 144 half hour slots in each Walk Prayer Vigil.

Individuals commit to pray during certain times by putting their name on the Prayer Vigil. This can be done multiple times. The Prayer Vigil is then put up in the Walk Conference Room on Friday afternoon during the Walk so the Team and Pilgrims can see they are being continually prayed for.

So, what can we do?

a) **Become the Prayer Coordinator** – Geoff Moore has done a great job for many years but has now stepped down. If you feel you would like to take on this very important role see Von or Andrew.

b) **Get the Prayer Vigil out early and promote it.** The paper version of the Vigil is available at the three Gatherings before a Walk.

c) **It is available online.** This has been the case for a number of years and will be so again this year. Go to the National Emmaus Website (www.emmaus.org.au); at the bottom on the left is a blue rectangle that says Prayer Vigils. This will take you to a list of all upcoming Walks in Australia and some overseas ones as well. Scroll down to the one you are interested in, open it and find a vacant time slot and put your name down and supply an email address. An email will be sent to you confirming the time(s) you have chosen and this can be used as a reminder.

d) **Another option is go direct to the Prayer Vigils (<https://vigil.emmaus.org.au>) to sign up.** Or go through the Canberra Monaro Emmaus website (canberramonaro.emmaus.org.au).

e) We are trying to renew and form new links with overseas Emmaus Communities. We can pray for their Walks during their midnight hours and they can do the same for us. The link to many overseas Walks and Chrysalis Flights is (www.prayervigils.net)

It is such a blessing to pray for the Pilgrims and Team during a Walk. We don't want people to miss out on the opportunity to be blessed and to bless others.





What is a 4th Day Talk?

At most Gatherings we have a Community member share a brief message about how God has been working in their life since they did their pilgrim Walk. 1 Peter 3:15 tells us to be ready to explain the hope we have within us. A 4th Day Talk is just that! It doesn't need to be long (10 minutes is plenty), it just needs to be real.

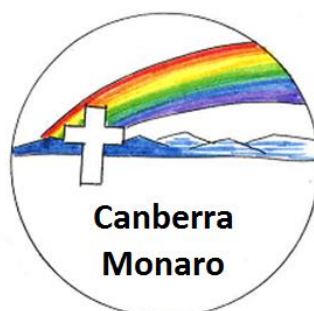
You might have just done your Walk or it might have been many years ago, it doesn't matter. If you share what has God done in your life I can assure you, what you say will powerfully impact others within the Community.
