A message from our Community Spiritual Director



There was a TV show in the 2000s called “24 Hours” which followed 24 hours of Agent Jack Bauer’s life battling overwhelming odds as he fought the baddies in a variety of improbable situations over 9 seasons. The episodes take place over the course of one hour, depicting events as they happen, in real time, and so time seemed to stretch out dramatically.

We have just entered Lent which is a time to focus on the last 24

hours of Jesus life. As we read it in our Bibles, “Snap”; 24 hours goes just like that. It is told in stark detail, yet with a brevity and economy of detail that leaves us a little shell shocked.

The Good Friday story packs a punch, and the focus is on Jesus, his Kingship and what suffering and pain he went through to save us. There is a sense of Jesus being in charge. He comes forward out of the garden and asks who it is they want; he stops Peter from defending him; he makes sure the followers get away; he gives considered answers to the High Priest and Pilate; he considers his mother, and he decides when to give up his spirit.

But these are not the only things he has endured. Jesus has experienced it all as a man. He started out a baby, and was a refugee in a foreign country when the Government had a price on his head. We don’t know all that much about his early years, but it was clearly a learning experience as the incident at Jerusalem shows when he went AWOL, but when he returned home he was obedient to his parents. Learning involves an often difficult process, even painful and in learning



obedience to his parents he prepared for obedience to his Heavenly Father as well.

Think of his other struggles: the 40 days in the desert and his temptations; his difficulties in leading and teaching a bunch of raw recruits; his run in’s with the religious authorities; his growing awareness of God’s call and what that entailed for him; the Gethsemane crisis. All this involved lots of pain and suffering which culminated in the experiences we read about through Lent.

Some Christians seem to gloss over the issue of pain and suffering. And in general we do our best to avoid it. But pain is necessary, for without it we don’t know something is wrong. A leper loses fingers, not because of the leprosy, but because they feel no pain and can’t tell they have an infection or that they have damaged themselves.

Similarly, spiritual pain is necessary to alert us to something that might be a problem with our spiritual welfare. Psychic pain is necessary as well as a warning system against the things which can be hurt or even kill our spiritual nature. The pain of the spirit can be as real as the pain of the body. The two were mixed on the Cross: Jesus certainly suffered the pain of the crucifixion, but he also suffered the psychic pain of spirit that caused him to cry out, “My God, my God, why have you forsaken me!”

So we don't like suffering. We want to get out of it, we want to escape, to be rescued, which is what the tele-evangelists promise, but there is a new and radical insight in Isaiah 53 and on into the NT, that salvation is found in voluntarily and spontaneously accepting the sufferings of sin in silence, not struggling against it or demanding vindication. We read in Heb 5:7ff " *While Jesus was here on earth, he offered prayers and pleadings, with a loud cry and tears, to the one who could rescue him from death. And God heard his prayers because of his deep reverence for God. [8] Even though Jesus was God's Son, he learned obedience from the things he suffered. [9] In this way, God qualified him as a perfect High Priest, and he became the source of eternal salvation for all those who obey him.*" Jesus prayer to the one who could save from death did not mean "escape from", but "deliverance through", and this is what he went on to do.

C.S. Lewis in his book "The problem of pain" says this: "the Christian doctrine of suffering explains, I believe, a very curious fact about the world we live in. The settled happiness and security which we all desire, God withholds from us by the very nature of the world: but joy, pleasure, and merriment, He has scattered broadcast. We are never safe, but we have plenty of fun, and some ecstasy. It is not hard to see why. The security we crave would teach

us to rest our hearts in this world and impose an obstacle to our return to God: a few moments of happy love, a landscape, a symphony, a merry meeting with our friends, a bath or a football match, have no such tendency. Our Father refreshes us on the journey with some pleasant inns, but will not encourage us to mistake them for home."

So if home is beyond, suffering prepares us somehow for a vision and hope that will propel us forward. Just as they say, "No pain, no gain", so God has ordained that suffering will spread our horizons beyond the physical world, and we can catch a glimpse of the kingdom which is to come and for which we work in bringing our walks to fruition. We can share out of our own pain and suffering as we minister to others, remembering that we walk in the footsteps of One who calls us to bear each other's burdens and empowers us to be priests of great holiness and deep humanity.

Walk Reflection

Women's Walk #94 Lay Director Report - Tracy Randall

It was with both prayer and anticipation that I arrived at Greenhills on the Thursday afternoon to start Walk #94. Training was completed and the phone and email were now out of action so it was now all in God's hands and the willing servants of the Emmaus community. The verse I had chosen as a theme for the Walk was from Psalm 91 'He will cover you with his feathers and under his wings you will find refuge', as I was looking for time separate from the world and its demands for the three days of our Walk, and God

demonstrated this protection to us throughout the Walk.

The very start of the Walk asked the team to trust God as our 9 pilgrims arrived, but we were down a team member. Some plans were quickly crafted – 'just in case', but were not needed as our group was completed just as we started the roll call for the new found friend's activity. The pilgrims were accepting of the early requests for phones off, watches away and a time of silence in preparation for the next three days.

Friday arrived with the bell. The silence was broken with Chapel, song and breakfast – the cooked food was appreciated by all. And then we began. The pilgrims listened, discussed, created and sang. The tables jelled with the table leaders and assistant table leaders commenting on how prepared the pilgrims were to think deeply about the talks presented and talk about them. Any worries about what was happening on the tables by those observing from the back were dissipated quickly and there were many prayer points sent to the prayer team in the community prayer chapel.

The request for creative responses to the talks was eagerly accepted by the pilgrims and significant talent was demonstrated with posters, sculpture, song, skits and dance all making appearances during the evening presentations. There were even expressions of disappointment when tables were informed there were no more creative responses required on Sunday morning.

The worship throughout the Walk was uplifting and I observed both laughter and tears during a number of songs. And whilst everyone joined in song from the start of Friday morning, there was a point late that afternoon where the intensity of response increased and from then on whenever there was song, I was lost in the emotional response that was given from pilgrims and team. I noticed the dining room coordinators enjoying the worship from the conference room stairs on a couple of occasions as well.

Agape was received with amazement – prayer roster, letters from other communities, laughter – emmaus watches, then incredulity as it continued to arrive and arrive to eventually an understanding that this was an expression of how incredible God's love for us as expressed

by others can be. By Sunday many of the pilgrims and team bore a strong resemblance to Christmas trees decorated by someone with rather eclectic taste.

All the big moments of the Walk occurred with the pilgrims continuing to accept and join in receiving more and more of God's love. Dying moments with the team and pilgrims handing their moments to God to deal led to personal breakthroughs and a more contemplative discussion at lunch; the wonderful dinner with beautiful music on Saturday evening and the beauty of candlelighting which blew many away and as always (no matter which side of the service I am on) brought me to tears. Then there were the personal letters bringing everything back to a more personal level, resulting in tears for many and closing where they were asked to share their responses to the weekend.

Any issues that occurred on the weekend were able to be dealt in a timely manner, be it recalcitrant locks on bathroom doors or computer software having a moment with help being available and work-arounds found. Clear evidence of God's protection and care for us all.

I would like to finish by saying that being a Walk Lay Director has been a privilege and an opportunity not to be missed. I thank all of the pilgrims for trusting us for this small step in your Christian journeys. Working with the Walk #94 team of women over the time spent in training, and team and pilgrims during the Walk itself has been both a chance to reflect, a blessing and a journey of growth as we all continue on our fourth days.

While it might feel like we are still in post-walk/Christmas mode, it's time to turn our attention to the upcoming Walks, which are only 3 months away.

Coming up on the 9th March is our Mega Agape Day, starting at 10am at O'Connor Uniting, one of my favourite days of the year. Come and help finish Agape; bring your own Agape and get help from others; help finish Community Agape (like notebooks); have a chat and a cuppa. Bring or buy some lunch and stay for the Gathering starting at 2pm. Craft skills not needed, just a willingness to help. If you need anything printed, laminated, or something else, please contact me prior to the Mega Agape morning in March, and I can bring supplies that day.



With sites like Temu, Wish and Shein popping up, it's easier than ever to create Agape, without being a crafty-type person. Lots of little gifts can be bought cheaply, and just need a tag added. Agape does not have to be complicated or expensive; it just needs a little thought, a little time, and a little money to buy supplies. Some reunion groups make Agape, but individuals can as well. One Agape we made involved printing a tag, cutting it out, and sticking a lolly to it. Simple!

I also find the following searches in Google helpful, when looking for ideas of what to make:

- Agape gift ideas
- Gifts for him/her under \$1
- Small Bible gifts to make
- Guides swaps
- Scouts swaps
- Sunday school gifts



You can start with an item you find, add a Bible verse and make Agape. Or you can start with a Bible verse, and buy/make something that goes with it. Also, you could think along the lines of the following to produce Agape: useful Agape, wearable Agape, edible Agape, fun Agape.

Agape can be just for the pilgrims, or can be for the whole team. Pilgrim numbers vary, but if you aim for 12-14 pieces, that should be enough, and if you are doing them for the whole team, aim for 35-40 pieces. We need Agape for both the Mens' and Womens' walks, so please consider doing some for both. If you are tight for space, bring any completed Agape to any of the gatherings, and I can store it until the Walk.

If you have an Agape that you'd like to be handed out at a specific time over the weekend, please mark it clearly. Our fairies will do their best to meet your request.

Thank you to everyone who made Agape for last year's Walks. It was beautiful again to see the pilgrims completely overwhelmed by the quantity of Agape they received, through gifts, prayer and service over the weekend.

I'd also like to thank those who have now stopped making Agape, for their faithful service, and gifts of love that they have showered onto the pilgrims over the years. My hope and prayer is that others will take up the mantle and we can continue serving the pilgrims through Agape. Even if you aren't in a reunion group, please consider making an Agape item for the walks, and coming to the Mega Agape Day.

Do you have a passion for organising? Do you have skills in helping others... to serve others?

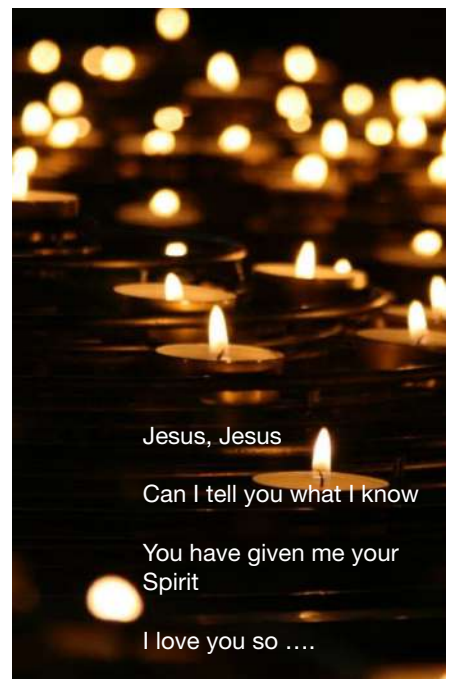
This is the job for you! We need a Serving Roster Coordinator to gather Servant Teams for each meal for the 72 hours of the Walk.
